Possible Extreme Hardship Factors

- 1. Applicant's age both at the time of entry and at the time of relief
- 2. Length of residence in the United States
- 3. Family members residing in the United States and their immigration/citizenship status
- 4. Family and other ties in the foreign country
- 5. Health conditions of the applicant's spouse, parents, and children, and the availability of required medical treatment in the foreign country
- 6. Financial impact of the applicant's departure
- 7. Ability of the applicant to obtain employment in the foreign country
- 8. Possibility of other means of immigrating
- 9. Economic and political conditions in the applicant's home country
- 10. Ability to raise children if family members are not available to help
- 11. Quality of life factors in the home country
- 12. Disruption of educational opportunities
- 13. Educational opportunities for children who do not speak, read, write language
- 14. Age, number, and immigration status of the applicant's children and their ability to speak the native language of the foreign country and adjust to life there
- 15. Separation from family members, especially in single parent situations
- 16. Separation from family members when qualifying relative is ill or elderly
- 17. Violence/ damage from civil war and disasters in home country
- 18. Psychological impact of the applicant's departure including depression, trauma
- 19. Political persecution in foreign country
- 20. Contributions to and ties to the community in the United States
- 21. Acculturation and integration into U.S. society, and
- 22. Severe personal consequences and non-economic hardship flowing from economic ones
